A DAY IN THE LIFE OF

A John Deere Snowmobile story

Deere introduced snowmobiles in 1972 with the models 400 and 500. Within a couple more years we had more models and more horsepower. In short order we were pushing 46 horsepower. These were 2 cylinder two-cycle engines that peaked at 6500 to 7000 rpm. Yes, These were two cylinder engines but far different from what Deere dealers were accustomed to in two cylinder engines!

If you are doing 70 mph down a straight-away you are sitting a few inches from the ground behind a screaming mass of power. It is a thrill all right! I can say I did that just once on an abandoned airport runway. (After carefully checking for any obstructions!) It was nearly impossible to read the gauges because they were shaking so much. We had these people that bragged their machine would do "close to a hundred"! I soon decided the only way they would run that fast was while sitting on the barstool!

The service people had to go through a real learning curve to learn how to adjust these carburetors and to get the clutching to work right. When everything did work right they could be a screaming demon on skis!


Knowing all these things I got a call from a Michigan dealer that he had a snowmobile brought in that would not run more than 30 mph. He cleaned and rebuilt the carburetor. No improvement! He checked out the ignition and put in new spark plugs. No improvement! He retraced his work and scrutinized the carburetor again. No improvement!

As soon as I arrived the dealer set to showing me how the engine ran. It just would not rev up. I happened to notice exhaust gases coming from the spring loaded ball joints in the exhaust system. (These joints allowed for engine vibration and prevented failure of the exhaust pipes.) So I grabbed a pair of pliers and unhooked the springs on one of the ball joints. The engine immediately sprang to life revving up to a piercing scream!

We scratched our heads a bit and then turned the snowmobile over. We found the exhaust pipe outlet partially crushed shut. Later the owner admitted to running over a log in the woods.

Ah yes, another challenging day!


